You are aware that evaluation is the most important process in the actual and correct assessment of the candidates. A small mistake in evaluation may lead to serious problems which may affect the future of the candidates, education system and teaching profession. To avoid mistakes, it is requested that before starting evaluation, you must read and understand the spot evaluation guidelines carefully. **Evaluation is a 10-12 days' mission for all of us. Hence, it is necessary that you put in your best efforts in this process.**

Evaluation is to be done as per instructions provided in the Marking Scheme. It should not be done according to one's own interpretation or any other consideration. Marking Scheme should be strictly adhered to and religiously followed. However, while evaluating, answers which are based on latest information or knowledge and/or are innovative, they may be assessed for their correctness otherwise and marks be awarded to them. (In class X, while evaluating two competency base questions, please try to understand given answer and even if answer is not from marking scheme but correct competency is enumerated by the candidate, marks should be awarded.

The Board permits candidate to obtain photocopy of the Answer Book on request in an RTI application and also separately as a part of the re-evaluation process on payment of the processing charges.

Instructions for Head Examiners/ Additional Head Examiners/Examiners:

1. The Head-Examiner must go through the first five answer books evaluated by each evaluator on the first day, to ensure that evaluation has been carried out as per the instructions given in the Marking Scheme. The remaining answer books meant for evaluation shall be given only after ensuring that there is no significant variation in the marking of individual evaluators.
2. The Examiners should acquaint themselves with the guidelines given in the Guidelines for spot Evaluation before starting the actual evaluation.
3. Every Examiner shall also ensure that all the answers are evaluated, marks carried over to the title page, correctly totaled and written in figures and words.
4. Any unassessed portion, non-carrying over of marks to the title page, or totaling error detected by the candidate shall damage the prestige of all the personnel engaged in the evaluation work as also of the Board. Hence, in order to uphold the prestige of all concerned, it is again reiterated that the instructions be followed meticulously and judiciously.

Do's:

1. The marking scheme carries only suggested value points for the answers.
2. These are only guidelines and do not constitute the complete answers.
3. The students can have their own expression and if the expression is correct, the marks be awarded accordingly.
4. While evaluating the answer scripts if the answer is found to be totally incorrect, (X) should be marked on the incorrect answer and awarded zero (0) Marks.
5. Evaluators will mark (✓) wherever answer is correct. For wrong answer "X" be marked. Evaluators will not put right kind of mark while evaluating which gives an impression that answer is correct and no marks are awarded. **This is the most common mistake which evaluators commit.**
6. If a question has parts, please award marks on the right-hand side for each part. Marks awarded for different parts of the question should then be totaled and written in the left-hand margin and encircled. This may be followed strictly.
7. If a question does not have any parts, marks must be awarded in the left hand margin and encircled. This may also be followed strictly.
8. If a candidate has attempted any extra question or part, marks obtained in the best question/part should be retained and the other answer should be scored out.
9. Short type answers asking for 2 features / characteristics / points: If there is a candidate who writes 2 points as directed and that too correctly, whereas the other lists 5 points of which first is correct, second is incorrect, the third correct and remaining incorrect, if the suggested value points are there in a 2 mark question he / she should be awarded the due marks.

10. In the marking scheme, a slash (/) indicates alternative answers; any one such answer is counted as correct.
11. Candidates should not be penalized if they do not follow the order of the sections / questions while answering.
12. Q.1, Q.2 and Q.8 are meant to test the comprehension of the candidates and not the ability of expression. Full credit should be given for the correct value points, even if the answer is not given in a full sentence.
13. If a student has attempted an extra question, answer to the question deserving more marks should be retained and the other answer scored out.
14. No marks to be deducted for the cumulative effect of an error. It should be penalized only once.
15. A full scale of marks 1-80 has to be used. Please do not hesitate to award full marks if the answer deserves it.
16. Every examiner has to necessarily do evaluation work for full working hours i.e. 8 hours every day and evaluate 20 answer books per day in main subjects and 25 answer books per day in other subjects (Details are given in Spot Guidelines)

Don't's

1. Ensure that you do not make the following common types of errors committed by the Examiner in the past: -
 - Leaving answer or part thereof unassessed in an answer book.
 - Giving more marks for an answer than assigned to it.
 - Wrong transfer of marks from the inside pages of the answer book to the title page.
 - Wrong question wise totaling on the title page.
 - Wrong totaling of marks of the two columns on the title page.
 - Wrong grand total.
 - Marks in words and figures not tallying.
 - Wrong transfer of marks from the answer book to online award list.
 - Answers marked as correct, but marks not awarded. (Ensure that the right tick mark is correctly and clearly indicated. It should merely be a line. Same is with the X for incorrect answer.)
 - Half or a part of answer marked correct and the rest as wrong, but no marks awarded.

- next moment his wings spread outward, felt tips of his wings cutting through the air
- gradually soaring downwards and outwards
- no longer afraid, a bit dizzy
- flapped his wings and soared upwards

- started fighting over petty things like Oxen Meadows, dogs.
- no matter about the proposal discussed
- did not follow the right approach
- should have been polite and patient
- after marriage all the things would belong to them
- should not have been rigid
- first priority should have been the proposal

Marking: Content- 4 marks
Fluency- 2 marks
Grammatical Accuracy- 2 marks

Value points: (Minimum four points)

-Horace Danby- a good, honest citizen, respectable man in society

- not completely honest
- loved rare, expensive books – could not afford them.
- robbed a safe every year after careful planning
- stole just enough to last for twelve months
- secretly bought the books
- had studied Shotover Grange for two weeks, looking at its rooms, electric wiring, its path and garden
- wanted to rob the safe that contained about fifteen thousand pounds worth of jewels
- expected to get at least five thousand pounds by selling them one by one
- interesting books coming for sale in the autumn
- took the key after he put on gloves and opened the door
- suddenly heard a lady standing in the doorway who acted as if she was the owner
- Horace was befooled: begged her to let him go
- eager to please her
- opened the safe for her as she had forgotten the number to open the safe: gave her the jewels as she claimed she had to wear them at a party that night.
- arrested for jewel robbery – lady a thief as well – had taken the robbed money

- sent to school on the suggestion of the tehsildar
- frightened at first – did not know what exactly a school was and what happened there.
- hoped to make a friend amongst girls present
- teacher – a kind woman – encouraged and motivated- instilled self-confidence, self-respect in her
- stopped stammering ultimately – became confident
- had courage to refuse to marry a mean, contemptible, greedy and lame old man
- planned to teach in the village school and serve her parents in their old age
- teacher looked at her with smiling eyes likes an artist – contemplating the completion of her masterpiece
